Lesson 6. Tomorrow What does the Catechism mean for you and future generations?

Prayer and Introduction

Important truths of the Reformation:

- ❖ We are declared righteous or good in God's eyes because of Jesus who has paid the penalty we deserve because of our sins. God's declaration is by grace alone and we receive it by faith in Jesus alone.
- ❖ We cannot come to faith on our own "by [our] own thinking for choosing." The Holy Spirit works faith in us through the gospel or the means of grace.
- ❖ When the Holy Spirit brings us to faith we are God's people or saints and sinners at the same time. We do continue to sin and need forgiveness regularly.
- As believers, we trust what God's Word or the Bible tells us. We trust no human authority but only trust the Scriptures. The Bible is God's Word.
- ❖ The Bible identifies two sacraments: Baptism and the Lord's Supper. They give us forgiveness, life, and salvation and are a means God uses to give us forgiveness and thereby strengthens and comforts us.
- ❖ The church is the assembly of believers in Jesus and includes all men, women, and children of races and social classes. All are equal in the sight of God but not all have the same role in the church.
- Christians are here on earth as temporary citizens; their citizenship is in heaven. While they are here they are to praise God, love others, and help others.





12. Taking it home. Take these steps to help use your Catechism regularly.

- 1. Use it for your regular devotions: Read a portion of the Catechism each day. Start at your birthday each year. Read it with your family. Start at the beginning and read a small portion. Use either Luther's words without the longer exposition or use the exposition. For example, either ready the First Commandment by itself or read the First Commandment with the exposition. Complete the entire Catechism and chose another resources. Then return to the catechism again on your next birthday.
- 2. The new Catechism exposition will have 51 lessons. When it is available this spring, use it and read one lesson each week.
- 3. The new Catechism exposition also has a section called "Connections" which can be used as a devotion. It includes a quote from Luther or the Confessions, a Bible story exercise, and a hymn.
- 4. Help your children learn their memory work; relearn it with them including the passages they are asked to know or memorize.
- **5.** Use *As Luther Taught the Word of Truth* by R. Lauersdorf. It is a boo of devotions on the Small Catechism (NPH catalog number: 060722)



Something to think about:

I lament my sin and desire comfort and refreshment for my soul (LC Confession 15)

For the Christian way essentially consists in acknowledging ourselves to be sinners and in praying for grace (LC Confession 9)

You are not safe from [the devil] for one hour. How soon he can have you brought suddenly into misery and distress when you least expect it!

Let this, then, be said for encouragement, not only for those of us who are old and grown, but also for the young people, who ought to be brought up in Christian doctrine and understanding. Then the Ten Commandments, the creed, and the Lord's Prayer might be taught to your youth more easily. Then they would receive them with pleasure and seriousness, and so they would use them from their youth and get used to them. For the old are now nearly past this opportunity. So these goals and others cannot be reached unless we train the people who are to come after us and succeed us in our office and work. We should do this in order that they also may bring up their children successfully so that God's Word and the Christian church may be preserved. Therefore let every father of a family know that it is his duty, by God's order and command to teach these things to his children, or to have the children learn what they ought to know (Ephesians 6:4). Since the children are baptized and received into the Christian church they should also enjoy this communion of the Sacrament, in order that they may serve us and be useful to us. They must all certainly help us to believe, love, pray and fight against the devil (LC 5, 84-87)
