## Prayer and Introduction,

Almost every Sunday we confess the Apostles' Creed together. Although it is an ecumenical creed that almost all Christian churches confess, is it only an outdated confession or is it still important?

Luther did not change the Apostles' Creed but he did divide it into three articles instead of 12, as it was done in his day. Why do you think he did that?

Luther begins the discussion of the Creed with these words, "The Ten Commandments are set so high that all human ability is far too feeble and weak to keep them" (LC 2, 2). There is a reason why he placed the Creed after the Commandments.



"The entire gospel that we preach is based on this point, that we properly understand this article (The Second Article) as that upon which our salvation and all happiness rests. It is so rich and complete that we can never learn it fully" (LC 2.33).
