Lesson 4: We Walk by Faith

Introduction

Think about the times in Israel's history where the LORD fought for his people and won the victory <u>for</u> them. **Name some of them here:**

In the portion of God's Word we will cover in this lesson, the LORD proves his power to the people of Israel, as he had done so many times before, in the hope that they might turn from their evil ways and come back to him. While such a return to the LORD may have taken place, it was oftentimes short-lived.



NOTE: Tonight's lesson involves what is called a "TPS" learning strategy: "Think" (T) – "Pair" (P) – "Share" (S). The learning process moves from the individual (who "thinks" about the text) to discussion with someone else ("pair") to "sharing" with the entire group / the web instructor.

I. Seeing.. Yet Not Seeing (2 Ki 6:8-23)

Aram is on the offensive again against Israel, yet the enemies of God's people cannot conceive what they are really up against.

Background and Map

The Text of 2 Ki 8-23 (read aloud)


Using a "TPS" strategy, discuss the following (about 10 min.)

- 1. Think Pair Share: Explain how vs. 9-10, and vs. 13-14 are a vivid illustration of amazing grace.
- 2. Think Pair Share: What does v. 16 mean?

- 3. *Think Pair Share:* Where is there a second remarkable example (or more!) of amazing grace in this section?
- 4. Think Pair Share: What unanswered question(s) come to mind?

Characteristics of Believes Who Display Confident Trust

Think – Pair – Share: Identify three or four characteristics that demonstrate how Elisha displayed his confident trust in the LORD. Then consider how we believers today can learn to "see the hosts" that our with us, to live in and work for the kingdom of Christ is similar confident trust.

II. Hearing... Yet Not Perceiving What God is Doing (2 Ki 6:24-7:20)

Again, Aram invades the land and in this call to repentance, God not only oppresses his people with an invading force, but by the siege and famine that affected the capital city of Samaria.

Background and Map

The Text of 2 Ki 6:24-7:20 (read aloud)


Using a "TPS" strategy, discuss the following (about 10 min.)

- 1. *Think Pair Share:* Explain how **7:1** only highlights God's amazing grace. Can you think of similar examples of God operating this way in Scripture?
- 2. Think Pair Share: Evaluate the actions of the lepers in **7:8-10.**
- 3. Think Pair Share: The basic idea of God's special covenant name ("The LORD," "Yahweh") is that it emphasizes he is "faithful." How do you see that concept emphasize in **7:14-20?**
- 4. Think Pair Share: What unanswered question(s) come to mind?

Lord, I Believe; Help Me Overcome My Unbelief!

Think – Pair – Share: Identify three or four instances of doubt or outright unbelief in the text, and consider how these same sins surface in our own lives. Then, discuss how God responded to such doubts in our text, as well as what warnings as well as encouragements we can take from God's actions.
